Black-Jewish Relations in the Country of Immigrants: Legacies Shared and Divided
Wednesday, January 14, 7:00 pm ET (online)



As a Jewish political refugee from the Soviet Union, Janna Kaplan understands the pain of discrimination and the agony of denied opportunities. As a career scientist, she studies data—the history and the present—and detects patterns and trends that offer some predictive insight into the future. Having married into an American Jewish family of Civil Rights leaders, she learned about the extraordinary power of a non-violent movement that united American Blacks and American Jews. Yet this powerful Black-Jewish alliance of the 1950s and 1960s, dedicated to the noble cause of equality, justice, and progress, eventually succumbed to challenges that continue to divide these communities today. The question remains: what can be done about it?

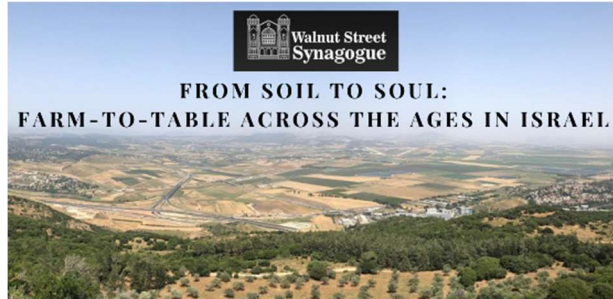
Janna Kaplan is Senior Research Scientist at Brandeis University specializing in Neuropsychology and Space Research. Janna's late husband, Edward Kivie Kaplan (1942-2024), a Brandeis professor in the Humanities and Religious Studies, was the son of Kivie Kaplan (1904-1975), a Boston industrialist who was deeply involved in the Jewish social action and in the Civil Rights movements. FROM SOIL TO SOUL FOOD SERIES



Ancient Practices – Agriculture of the Ancestors

Wednesday, January 28, 7:00 pm ET (online)

We begin by traveling back in time to explore how ancient Israelites cultivated the land using terracing, spring-fed irrigation, and the Seven Species —figs, grapes, olives, pomegranates, dates, wheat, and barley. Featured are two important heritage sites: Neot Kedumim, the biblical landscape reserve, and Sataf, where ancient techniques are still visible in the hills outside Jerusalem. We'll also trace the development of wine from biblical times to today's boutique vineyards, examining how ancient viticulture inspired Israel's booming wine industry and how wine remains both a ritual and a symbol of rootedness in the land.

Join us as we explore how American Jewish life has been built, rebuilt, uprooted, and re-rooted over 250+ years, tracing a story of mobility, reinvention, and opportunity from colonial port cities to today's suburbs and Sunbelt hubs.

Part 3 – From the Lower East Side to Main Street explores mass Eastern European immigration (1880–1924), urban growth, labor and tenement life, the flowering of Yiddish culture, and the push west and south to places like Boston and beyond.

Part 4 – From Suburbia to Sunbelt surveys 1924-2024 immigration restriction, postwar suburbanization, the rise of new Jewish centers outside major cities, the growth of communities in Los Angeles, Houston, Phoenix, Atlanta, Boca Raton, Austin and more, and what American Jewish mobility may tell us about the next chapter ahead.

Jonathan D. Sarna, PhD, is the University Professor and Joseph H. & Belle R. Braun Professor of American Jewish History at Brandeis University and one of the world's leading scholars of American Judaism. He also serves as Chief Historian of the National Museum of American Jewish History and has been named to Newsweek's list of "America's 50 Most Influential Rabbis" (as a scholar). A graduate of Brandeis University (BA) and Yale University (PhD), Prof. Sarna has authored or edited more than 30 books, including the award-winning *American Judaism: A History, When General Grant Expelled the Jews, Lincoln and the Jews*, and *Jews and the Civil War*. American Jews went from a cautious, politically invisible minority to one of the most influential political communities in the country, and this four-part series traces the surprising—and often dramatic—story of that transformation.

Part 2 – Union, Reconstruction & the Gilded Age (1840–1914) examines Jewish combatants and chaplains in the Civil War, General Grant's Order No. 11 and its aftermath, and the growth of Jewish advocacy amid civil-rights and immigration debates.

Part 3 – From Eugene V. Debs to Lyndon Johnson follows the rise of Jewish progressive politics shaped by immigrant experience, labor activism, the New Deal coalition, and Jewish leadership in law, civil rights, and national political organizations.

Part 4 – A House Divided surveys Jewish politics since the 1960s — realignment, Israel and social issues, the emergence of a growing Republican wing, generational divides and identity politics, and what 2026 might reveal about the next era of Jewish American political life.

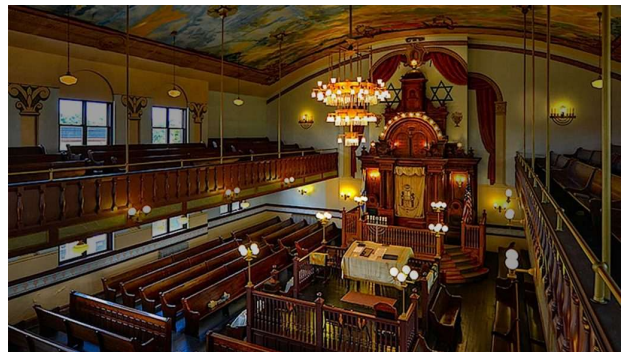
