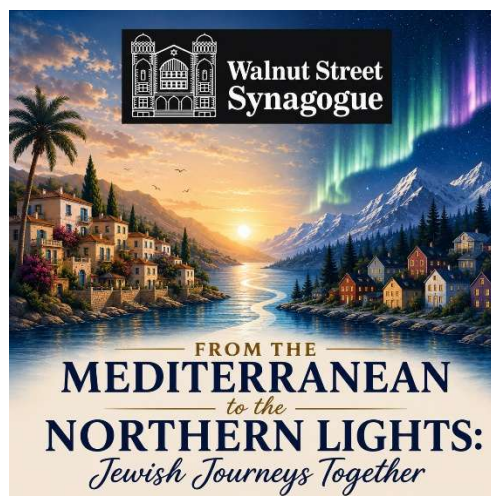

Xueta Island Film Screening & Q&A with Filmmaker

Thursday, June 11, 12:00 pm ET (online)

Xueta Island is a documentary film that explores Inquisition history, Jewish revival, and identity. Some Catholics on the Spanish island of Mallorca (Majorca) have been discriminated against for centuries because their surnames have a connection to a Jewish heritage. They not only endured stigma and humiliation: they were also deprived of fundamental rights as citizens. While a few have been inspired to return to the faith of their ancestors, their recent entry into the leadership of the local Jewish community has caused an unforeseen controversy among its members. Are they the best suited to lead Mallorquin Judaism despite not having practiced their faith for centuries? **Join filmmaker Dani Rotstein on a Director Talkback after viewing the film that will be open for two days before the online discussion.**

Dani Rotstein is a content producer, entrepreneur, and storyteller from New Jersey whose international media career led him to Mallorca in 2014. There, he uncovered the island's little-known Jewish history, inspiring his co-direction of the documentary *Xueta Island* and sparking a mission to help revive Jewish memory in Spain. He founded Jewish Majorca, a travel company offering immersive Jewish heritage tours across Spain and Portugal. Dani also leads the Re-Emerge Project, a documentary series exploring emerging Jewish communities across Latin America. Through storytelling and travel, he connects past and present, one journey at a time.

From Sand to Skyline – An Urban Tel Aviv Exploration

Part 1 – Built to Tell: Tel Aviv in Architecture - Thursday, June 4, 1:00 pm ET (online)

Part 2 – Markets & Migrations: A Taste of Tel Aviv - Thursday, June 11, 1:00 pm ET (online)

In this second two-part installment of our Tel Aviv series with Gila, we dive into the city's origin story through two lenses that define it: architecture and flavor.

Part 1 – Built to Tell: Tel Aviv in Architecture - We will trace the city's evolution from eclectic Ottoman facades to the clean, modernist lines of Bauhaus design, exploring Rothschild Boulevard, Kikar Bialik's historic municipal building, and the transformation of a sandy outpost into the iconic White City.

Part 2 – Markets & Migrations: A Taste of Tel Aviv - We will follow the city's history through its kitchens and markets, from the restored Saron Market in a 19th century Templar colony to the vibrant Hatikvah Market, discovering how waves of immigration shaped Tel Aviv's culinary identity one street food bite at a time. Together, these sessions reveal a city built not only in stone and steel, but in stories, spice, and restless reinvention.

Originally from Sydney, Australia, Gila Levitan moved to Israel 20 years ago, transitioning from a career in physiotherapy to becoming a top-rated tour guide, celebrated on TripAdvisor. With her passion for detail and love for teaching, Gila will enrich your knowledge and inspire your next adventure. Join us for a provocative and engaging series on some of the most eyebrow-raising practices in Jewish law — from the Eruv and selling Chametz to Heter Iska, Prozbul, Shemitah sales, Shabbat elevators, and more — beginning with an opening session titled “Are the Clever Jews Trying to Fake Us Out?” We start with the nagging question many people have when they encounter these practices: are these authentic expressions of halachic seriousness, or just brilliant religious workarounds dressed up to look legitimate? With honesty, nuance, and intellectual rigor, this series will explore how generations of rabbinic thinkers confronted real human needs while remaining deeply anchored to the framework of Jewish law, revealing that what may first look like legal sleight-of-hand often opens into a much deeper story about responsibility, creativity, and the moral life of halacha.

Marc Michael Epstein, winner of CSP's 4th Annual Maimonides Award for Excellence in Adult Jewish Education and the 2015 National Jewish Book Award in Visual Arts for *Skies of Parchment, Seas of Ink*, grew up in Brooklyn in a family of Slonimer and Lubavitcher Hasidim and Romanian socialists. Since 1992 he has taught at Vassar College as Professor of Religion (and founding Director of Jewish Studies), offering courses on medieval Christianity, Jewish texts, and the interplay of religion, art, and politics. An Oberlin and Yale graduate with research at the Hebrew University, he is the author of numerous studies of Jewish visual and material culture, including *The Medieval Haggadah: Art, Narrative, and Religious Imagination*, named a Times Literary Supplement “Best Book of the Year.” Formerly Director of Hebrew

Books and Manuscripts at Sotheby's, he now consults internationally for libraries, museums, auction houses, and private collectors; his newest book is People of the Image: Jews and Art.

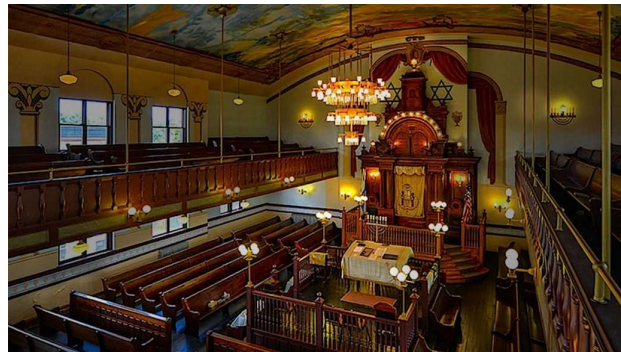
